Plaintiff, ABNER MATEO, on behalf of himself and all others similarly situated (hereinafter "Plaintiff") by and through his undersigned attorney, alleges against the abovenamed Defendant, ARS NATIONAL SERVICES, INC. ("ARS), JOHN DOES 1-25 their employees, agents, and successors (collectively "Defendants") the following:

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

1. Plaintiff brings this action for damages and declaratory relief arising from the Defendants' violation of 15 U.S.C. § 1692 *et seq.*, the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act (hereinafter "FDCPA"), which prohibits debt collectors from engaging in abusive, deceptive and unfair practices.

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

2. This Court has jurisdiction over this action pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1331. This is an action for violations of 15 U.S.C. § 1692 *et seq*.

3. Venue is proper in this district under 28 U.S.C. §1391(b)(2) because the acts of the Defendant that give rise to this action, occurred in substantial part, in this district.

DEFINITIONS

4. As used in reference to the FDCPA, the terms "creditor," "consumer," "debt," and "debt collector" are defined in § 803 of the FDCPA and 15 U.S.C. § 1692a.

PARTIES

5. The FDCPA, 15 U.S.C. § 1692 *et seq.*, which prohibits certain debt collection practices provides for the initiation of court proceedings to enjoin violations of the FDCPA and to secure such equitable relief as may be appropriate in each case.

6. Plaintiff is a natural person and a resident of the County of Essex, State of New Jersey, and is a "Consumer" as defined by 15 U.S.C. § 1692a(3).

7. ARS maintains a location at 201 W. Grand Avenue, Escondido, California 92025.

8. Upon information and belief, ARS uses the mail, telephone, and facsimile and regularly engages in business the principal purpose of which is to attempt to collect debts alleged to be due another.

9. ARS is a "Debt Collector" as that term is defined by 15 U.S.C. § 1692(a)(6).

10. John Does 1-25, are fictitious names of individuals and business alleged for the purpose of substituting names of defendants whose identities will be disclosed in discovery and should be made parties to this action.

CLASS ACTION ALLEGATIONS

11. Plaintiff brings this action as a state wide class action, pursuant to Rule 23 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure (hereinafter "FRCP"), on behalf of himself and all New Jersey consumers and their successors in interest (the "Class"), who were sent debt collection letters and/or notices from the Defendants which are in violation of the FDCPA, as described in this Complaint.

12. This Action is properly maintained as a class action. The Class is initially defined

as:

• All New Jersey consumers who were sent letters and/or notices from ARS concerning a debt owned by CAPITAL ONE BANK (USA), N.A. which contained at least one of the alleged violations of 15 U.S.C. § 1692 *et seq.* herein.

The class definition may be subsequently modified or refined. The Class period begins one year to the filing of this Action.

13. The Class satisfies all the requirements of Rule 23 of the FRCP for maintaining a class action:

- Upon information and belief, the Class is so numerous that joinder of all members is impracticable because there may be hundreds and/or thousands of persons who were sent debt collection letters and/or notices from the Defendants that violate specific provisions of the FDCPA. Plaintiff is complaining of a standard form letter and/or notice. (*See Exhibit A*, except that the undersigned attorney has, in accordance with Fed. R. Civ. P. 5.2 redacted the financial account numbers and/or personal identifiers in an effort to protect Plaintiff's privacy);
- There are questions of law and fact which are common to the Class and which predominate over questions affecting any individual Class member. These common questions of law and fact include, without limitation:
 - a. Whether the Defendants violated various provisions of the FDCPA including but not limited to:

15 U.S.C. §§ 1692e et seq and 1692e(10).

- b. Whether Plaintiff and the Class have been injured by the Defendants' conduct;
- c. Whether Plaintiff and the Class have sustained damages and are entitled to restitution as a result of Defendants' wrongdoing and if so, what is the proper measure and appropriate statutory formula to be applied in determining such damages and restitution; and
- d. Whether Plaintiff and the Class are entitled to declaratory and/or injunctive relief.
- Plaintiff's claims are typical of the Class, which all arise from the same operative facts and are based on the same legal theories.
- Plaintiff has no interest adverse or antagonistic to the interest of the other members of the Class.
- Plaintiff will fairly and adequately protect the interest of the Class and has retained experienced and competent attorneys to represent the Class.
- A Class Action is superior to other methods for the fair and efficient adjudication of the claims herein asserted. Plaintiff anticipates that no unusual difficulties are likely to be encountered in the management of this class action.
- A Class Action will permit large numbers of similarly situated persons to prosecute their common claims in a single forum simultaneously and without the duplication of effort and expense that numerous individual actions would engender. Class treatment will also permit the adjudication of relatively small claims by many Class members who could not otherwise afford to seek legal

redress for the wrongs complained of herein. Absent a Class Action, class members will continue to suffer losses of statutory protected rights as well as monetary damages. If Defendants' conduct is allowed to proceed without remedy, they will continue to reap and retain the proceeds of their ill-gotten gains.

• Defendants have acted on grounds generally applicable to the entire Class, thereby making appropriate final injunctive relief or corresponding declaratory relief with respect to the Class as a whole.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

14. Plaintiff is at all times to this lawsuit, a "consumer" as that term is defined by 15U.S.C. § 1692a(3).

15. Sometime prior to January 18, 2016, Plaintiff allegedly incurred a financial obligation to CAPITAL ONE BANK (USA), N.A. ("CAPITAL ONE BANK").

16. The CAPITAL ONE BANK obligation arose out of a transaction, in which money, property, insurance or services, which are the subject of the transaction, are primarily for personal, family or household purposes.

17. The CAPITAL ONE BANK obligation is a "debt" as defined by 15 U.S.C. § 1692a(5).

18. CAPITAL ONE BANK is a "creditor" as defined by 15 U.S.C. § 1692a(4).

On or before January 18, 2016, CAPITAL ONE BANK referred the CAPITAL
 ONE BANK obligation to ARS for the purpose of collections.

20. At the time CAPITAL ONE BANK referred the CAPITAL ONE BANK obligation to ARS, the obligation was past due.

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21. At the time CAPITAL ONE BANK referred the CAPITAL ONE BANK obligation to ARS, the obligation was in default.

22. Defendant caused to be delivered to Plaintiff a letter dated January 18, 2016, which was addressed to Plaintiff. **Exhibit A.**

23. The January 18, 2016 letter was sent to Plaintiff in connection with the collection of the CAPITAL ONE BANK obligation.

24. The January 18, 2016 letter is a "communication" as defined by 15 U.S.C. § 1692a(2).

25. Upon receipt, Plaintiff read the January 18, 2016 letter.

26. The January 18, 2016 letter provides the following information regarding the total balance claimed due on the CAPITAL ONE BANK obligation:

BALANCE: \$3,701.74

27. The January 18, 2016 letter stated in part the following:

Subject to your right noted above, one option to resolve your account for the reduced amount of \$2,591.22. That's a savings of \$1,110.52.

POLICIES AND PRACTICES COMPLAINED OF

28. It is Defendants' policy and practice to send written collection communications, in

the form annexed hereto as **Exhibit A**, which violate the FDCPA, by *inter alia*:

- (a) Using false, deceptive or misleading representations or means in connection with the collection of a debt; and
- (b) Using unfair or unconscionable means to collect or attempt to collect any debt.

29. On information and belief, Defendants sent written communications in the form annexed hereto as **Exhibit A**, to at least 50 natural persons in the State of New Jersey with one year of this Complaint.

COUNT I

FAIR DEBT COLLECTION PRACTICES ACT, 15 U.S.C. § 1692 et seq. VIOLATIONS

30. Plaintiff, on behalf of himself and others similarly situated, repeats and realleges all prior allegations as if set forth at length herein.

31. Collection letters and/or notices, such as those sent by Defendants, are to be evaluated by the objective standard of the hypothetical "least sophisticated consumer."

32. Defendant's settlement offer would cause the least sophisticated consumer to believe that if the requested payment was made that the consumer would receive a \$1,110.52 savings. Defendant knew that the \$1,110.52 savings may cause a tax consequence thereby reducing the actual savings amount that Defendant specifically represented.

33. The form, layout and content of Defendant's letter would cause the least sophisticated consumer to be confused about his or her rights and the consequences of accepting Defendant's offer to settle.

34. The form, layout and content of Defendant's letter would cause the least sophisticated consumer to be wrongly believe that by accepting Defendant's offer to settle for \$2,591.22, the consumer would satisfy this debt with the current creditor and achieve a receive a total savings of \$1,110.52.

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35. Defendant attempted to entice Plaintiff and others similarly into accepting the settlement offer by explicitly representing a specific savings amount when the Defendant knew that the savings offer was a false, deceptive or misleading representation.

36. Defendant violated various provisions of the FDCPA including but not limited to:
15 U.S.C. §§ 1692e *et seq* and 1692e(10).

37. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e of the FDCPA by using any false, deceptive or misleading representation or means in connection with their attempts to collect debts from Plaintiff and others similarly situated.

38. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e of the FDCPA in connection with their communications to Plaintiff and others similarly situated.

39. Defendant's conduct, as described herein, violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e of the FDCPA in connection with its communications to Plaintiff and others similarly situated.

40. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e by attempting to entice Plaintiff and others similarly into accepting the settlement offer by explicitly representing a specific savings amount when the Defendant knew that the savings offer was a false, deceptive or misleading representation.

41. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e by falsely representing a specific savings amount to Plaintiff when the Defendant knew that there may be a tax consequence thereby reducing the actual savings amount.

42. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e by falsely or deceptively representing that if Plaintiff accepted Defendant's offer to settle for \$2,591.22, the consumer would satisfy this debt with the current creditor and achieve a receive a total savings of \$\$1,110.52. 43. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e by failing to advise Plaintiff and others similarly situated that the savings amount could have an impact on his or her taxes or on income-sensitive benefits.

44. Section 1692e(10) prohibits the use of any false representation or deceptive means to collect or attempt to collect any debt.

45. Defendants violated 15 U.S.C. § 1692e(10) by making a false representation or deceptive means to collect or attempt to collect the debt as described herein.

46. Congress enacted the FDCPA in part to eliminate abusive debt collection practices by debt collectors.

47. Plaintiff and others similarly situated have a right to free from abusive debt collection practices by debt collectors.

48. Plaintiff and others similarly situated have a right to receive proper notices mandated by the FDCPA.

49. Plaintiff and others similarly situated were sent letters which could have affected their decision-making with regard to the debt.

50. Plaintiff and others similarly situated have suffered harm as a direct result of the abusive, deceptive and unfair collection practices described herein.

51. Plaintiff has suffered damages and other harm as a direct result of the Defendants' actions, conduct, omissions and violations of the FDCPA described herein.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff demands judgment against Defendants as follows:

(a) Declaring that this action is properly maintainable as a Class Action and certifying Plaintiff as Class representative and the attorneys, Joseph K. Jones, Esq., and Glen H. Chulsky, Esq., as Class Counsel;

- (b) Awarding Plaintiff and the Class statutory damages;
- (c) Awarding Plaintiff and the Class actual damages;
- (d) Awarding pre-judgment interest;
- (e) Awarding post-judgment interest.
- (f) Awarding Plaintiff costs of this Action, including reasonable attorneys'

fees and expenses; and

(g) Awarding Plaintiff and the Class such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTORNEYS COMPLETING CIVIL COVER SHEET FORM JS 44

Authority For Civil Cover Sheet

The JS 44 civil cover sheet and the information contained herein neither replaces nor supplements the filings and service of pleading or other papers as required by law, except as provided by local rules of court. This form, approved by the Judicial Conference of the United States in September 1974, is required for the use of the Clerk of Court for the purpose of initiating the civil docket sheet. Consequently, a civil cover sheet is submitted to the Clerk of Court for each civil complaint filed. The attorney filing a case should complete the form as follows:

I. (a) **Plaintiffs-Defendants.** Enter names (last, first, middle initial) of plaintiff and defendant. If the plaintiff or defendant is a government agency, use only the full name or standard abbreviations. If the plaintiff or defendant is an official within a government agency, identify first the agency and then the official, giving both name and title.

(b) County of Residence. For each civil case filed, except U.S. plaintiff cases, enter the name of the county where the first listed plaintiff resides at the time of filing. In U.S. plaintiff cases, enter the name of the county in which the first listed defendant resides at the time of filing. (NOTE: In land condemnation cases, the county of residence of the "defendant" is the location of the tract of land involved.)

(c) Attorneys. Enter the firm name, address, telephone number, and attorney of record. If there are several attorneys, list them on an attachment, noting in this section "(see attachment)".

II. Jurisdiction. The basis of jurisdiction is set forth under Rule 8(a), F.R.C.P., which requires that jurisdictions be shown in pleadings. Place an "X" in one of the boxes. If there is more than one basis of jurisdiction, precedence is given in the order shown below.

United States plaintiff. (1) Jurisdiction based on 28 U.S.C. 1345 and 1348. Suits by agencies and officers of the United States are included here.

United States defendant. (2) When the plaintiff is suing the United States, its officers or agencies, place an "X" in this box.

Federal question. (3) This refers to suits under 28 U.S.C. 1331, where jurisdiction arises under the Constitution of the United States, an amendment to the Constitution, an act of Congress or a treaty of the United States. In cases where the U.S. is a party, the U.S. plaintiff or defendant code takes precedence, and box 1 or 2 should be marked.

Diversity of citizenship. (4) This refers to suits under 28 U.S.C. 1332, where parties are citizens of different states. When Box 4 is checked, the citizenship of the different parties must be checked. (See Section III below; federal question actions take precedence over diversity cases.)

III. Residence (citizenship) of Principal Parties. This section of the JS 44 is to be completed if diversity of citizenship was indicated above. Mark this section for each principal party.

IV. Nature of Suit. Place an "X" in the appropriate box. If the nature of suit cannot be determined, be sure the cause of action, in Section VI below, is sufficient to enable the deputy clerk or the statistical clerks in the Administrative Office to determine the nature of suit. If the cause fits more than one nature of suit, select the most definitive.

V. Origin. Place an "X" in one of the seven boxes.

Original Proceedings. (1) Cases which originate in the United States district courts.
