Notice of Data Breach

We are writing to notify you of a data security incident that may have involved some of your personal information as a current or former student of Rio Hondo Community College District ("Rio Hondo"). This notice explains the incident, what we are doing, and steps you may want to take in response.

What Happened? On October 19, 2023, we discovered that certain devices in our network had been encrypted with ransomware. Upon learning of this, we took prompt action to secure the network and engaged an outside cybersecurity firm to assist in an investigation. That investigation determined that there was unauthorized access to Rio Hondo's network between October 12, 2023, and October 19, 2023, during which time certain files were taken. Rio Hondo retained a vendor to conduct a comprehensive review of the files to determine whether the files contained any sensitive student information. This process was resource intensive and involved multiple steps to ensure the scope, accuracy, and completeness of the review.

What Information Was Involved? On January 25, 2024, we determined that personal information regarding some current and former students of Rio Hondo may have been accessed by an unauthorized individual, including their names, addresses, Social Security numbers, and full dates of birth.

What We Are Doing. To prevent something like this from happening again, we have taken steps to further enhance our existing security measures. We have also arranged for you to receive credit monitoring and identity protection services through IDX at no cost to you. These identity protection services include 12 months of credit monitoring, a \$1,000,000 insurance reimbursement policy, and fully managed identity theft recovery services. These services are completely free to you and enrolling in this program will not hurt your credit score.

What You Can Do. We wanted to notify you of this incident and to assure you that we take it seriously. ADDITIONAL STEPS YOU CAN TAKE

We remind you it is always advisable to be vigilant for incidents of fraud or identity theft by reviewing your account statements and free credit reports for any unauthorized activity over the next 12 to 24 months. You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting companies. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your state. You can obtain information from these sources about steps an individual can take to avoid identity theft as well as information about fraud alerts and security freezes. You should also contact your local law enforcement authorities and file a police report. Fraud Alerts and Credit or Security Freezes:

Fraud Alerts: There are two types of general fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for one year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft with the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years.

To place a fraud alert on your credit reports, contact one of the nationwide credit bureaus. A fraud alert is free. The credit bureau you contact must tell the other two, and all three will place an alert on their versions of your report.

For those in the military who want to protect their credit while deployed, an Active Duty Military Fraud Alert lasts for one year and can be renewed for the length of your deployment. The credit bureaus will also take you off their marketing lists for pre-screened credit card offers for two years, unless you ask them not to.

Credit or Security Freezes: You have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, free of charge, which makes it more difficult for identity thieves to open new accounts in your name. That's because most creditors need to see your credit report before they approve a new account. If they can't see your report, they may not extend the credit.

How do I place a freeze on my credit reports? There is no fee to place or lift a security freeze. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a security freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. You'll need to supply your name, address, date of birth, Social Security number and other personal information. After receiving your freeze request, each credit bureau will provide you with a unique PIN (personal identification number) or password. Keep the PIN or password in a safe place. You will need it if you choose to lift the freeze. *How do I lift a freeze*? A freeze remains in place until you ask the credit bureau to temporarily lift it or remove it altogether. If the request is made online or by phone, a credit bureau must lift a freeze within one hour. If the request is made by mail, then the bureau must lift the freeze no later than three business days after getting your request.

If you opt for a temporary lift because you are applying for credit or a job, and you can find out which credit bureau the business will contact for your file, you can save some time by lifting the freeze only at that particular credit bureau. Otherwise, you need to make the request with all three credit bureaus.
